I love Christmas music, both for sentimental and spiritual reasons. It reminds me of special Christmases past, but also prepares me for the Christmas that is coming. Matt Rawles writes that "If 'faith comes from listening,' then Christmas must be the most faithful time of the year...It's hard to imagine Christmas without music." Dec. 21: 'O Little Town of Bethlehem' (ONE, 10 am Service)


Dec. 24: 'Joy to the World' - Christmas Eve Candlelight and Communion services, 4 pm and 6 pm

NOVEMBER HIGHLIGHTS

St. Francis Women's Club Event

In November, the Soup Kitchen welcomed 45 members of St. Francis Women's Club to a "Let's Make an Amazing Meal" event. Collaborating with Second Helpings, Tricia Rawls demonstrated how rescued food can be transformed into delicious meals. Additionally, Nick Nicholson shared his impactful video, "A Morning with the St. Andrew Soup Kitchen," capturing the heart of our service. A sample Harvest Table was displayed, and St. Francis generously gave both food donations and a monetary contribution.

Volunteer Appreciation Lunch

Days later we hosted our second annual Soup Kitchen Volunteer Lunch to honor the weekly dedication of over 70 volunteers. The Celebration Center was transformed into a beautiful dining venue, and 50 volunteers attended, enjoying an exceptional meal provided by Sea Pines Resorts, a valued partner. The abundance of food allowed us to share leftovers with our guests the next day. During the event, we revisited Nick's inspiring video and reflected on our mission. Volunteers spoke at an open mic, sharing their experiences and expressing gratitude for one another's service.

Thanksgiving Lunch

Our Thanksgiving lunch, held on Friday, November 28, featured leftovers from the Community Thanksgiving Dinner—another example of how the Soup Kitchen resourcefully provides nourishing meals using rescued food.

YOUR YEAR-END GIVING MAKES A DIFFERENCE

As we come to the end of 2025 we wanted to share a brief financial update. Through October our giving totals \$825,274, an amount that is ahead of 2024 giving but below the budget we established for the year. Our staff has done an excellent job of keeping YTD Expenses (\$855,933) below budget by over \$27,000 but a gap of \$30,659 still exists between Giving and Expenses. St. Andrew By-the-Sea is blessed, and we continue to bless those around us who need our support.

South Carolina Conference The United Methodist Church

News from SC Annual Conference: Four amendments to our UMC constitution have been ratified and become effective immediately.

The four amendments passed at the 2024 General Conference, held in Charlotte. But because they changed the UMC constitution, they required ratification by at least two-thirds of the total voting members of all the annual conferences combined. To clarify, that does not mean a two-thirds vote at each annual conference is needed but rather two-thirds of all 127 annual conferences around the world.

The amendments are as follows:

1. Regionalization: This package of amendments creates new regional conferences that will each have equal power to adapt portions of the UMC's Book of Discipline within their respective regions.
2. Inclusiveness of the Church: This adds the words "gender" and "ability" to Paragraph 4, Article 4, of the UMC constitution to categories that cannot be used to exclude membership in the denomination.
3. Racial Justice: This strengthens Article V of the UMC constitution by explicitly recognizing the church's role in combating racism, racial inequity, colonialism, White privilege and White supremacy.
4. Educational Requirements for Clergy: This amends Section VI, Article IV of the UMC constitution, which establishes the educational requirements for clergy members of annual or provisional conferences who are eligible to vote for clergy delegates to the General Conference.

"The ratification and certification of these constitutional amendments mark a defining moment in the continuing renewal and unity of The United Methodist Church," said Bishop Tracy S. Malone, president of the Council of Bishops. "These amendments reflect the church's rich diversity and deep commitment to live more fully into our shared mission to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world and strengthens our world-wide connection to serve faithfully and inclusively in every context."

Thank you all for being there, for helping me, and for serving so graciously.

We survived COVID and learned the new skill of on-line worship and meetings by Zoom. We grew spiritually from all of the pastors who served St. Andrew during this time.

We made a difficult decision regarding our Bluffton connection, but still helped launch a new church of believers and then re-oriented St. Andrew to focus our outreach efforts... resurrecting Christmas Grace on the South End, expanding our missions and using our hands and feet to serve others.

We resolved to remain with and uphold the United Methodist Church, seeking to genuinely welcome and embrace all who enter our buildings without regard to the color of their skin, their ethnic background, their identity, and diversity. I am very proud of all the volunteers, staff and congregants who make this church truly a family that strives to live our lives as Christ would have us to do. I look forward to seeing St. Andrew continue to flourish.

While the role has occasionally been challenging, the opportunity to create warm and lasting friendships, to influence our future, and to grow as a leader has been without equal. But, all good things must come to an end. I shall continue to volunteer and serve and witness. Most importantly, I urge everyone to be as supportive of our new Council Chair, Bob Dietz, as you have been to me. Steeped in Methodist discipline from his time in the New Jersey conference, financially astute from his professional career, and devout in his faith and service – not to mention being an excellent singer – Bob is more than capable of taking on this role.






Disciple Fast Track 3 Remember Who You Are: The Prophets
